#### **SUBJECT:**

**Action:** Adoption of Resolutions: Approve Transportation Development Act (TDA) Claims for the Cities of Exeter, Farmersville, Woodlake, and Porterville for Fiscal Year 2019/20

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The Transportation Development Act (TDA) was passed in 1971 and provides transit funding for local agencies from two sources. The Local Transportation Fund (LTF) is derived through a ¼ cent of general sales tax collected statewide. The State Transit Assistance (STA) Fund is derived from a statewide sales tax on gasoline and diesel fuels, and augmented by funds received via SB 1. Tulare County Association of Governments (TCAG) approves the apportionments, accounting for transfer agreements between agencies, for transit services for each fiscal year. TCAG reviews the claims and instructs the County Auditor on the payment of funds to each respective agency. Many requirements exist for approving claims, including items such as budget information and farebox recovery ratios, to vehicle safety inspection reports and compliance with fiscal and performance audits.

It should be noted that STA funds are allocated annually by the State Controller, and LTF funds are a result of sales tax revenues; the available amount of TDA funding available for 2019/20 is an estimate. Claim amounts in excess of actual receipts will not be paid out; conversely, excess revenues can be claimed via a claim amendment or in the following fiscal year.

#### SUBJECT:

**Action:** Adoption of Resolution: Approve New Active Transportation Advisory Committee (ATAC) Member

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The Active Transportation Advisory Committee (ATAC), formerly the Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC), is an advisory committee established by TCAG to advise on non-motorized transportation issues. One of the ATAC's main focuses is to help identify and prioritize bicycle/pedestrian projects and provide comments and input on issues related to development of the Regional Active Transportation Plan (RATP). Final decisions on the RATP will be the responsibility of the TCAG Board of Governors.

Additionally, the purpose of the ATAC is to advise on active transportation policy and planning activities. While the ATAC will provide comments and input on issues brought to it by TCAG staff and other parties, the final approval of major policy or project prioritization changes will continue to be the responsibility of the TCAG Board of Governors.

In April 2016, the ATAC members approved their draft committee guidelines. The TCAG Board approved those guidelines for the conduct of business of the ATAC in June 2016.

Mark Wall has previously attended ATAC meetings as part of the Visalia Waterways and Trails Committee which has since disbanded. Mr. Wall, with his background in transit planning and role in active transportation advocacy, and membership with Southern Sierra Cyclists has proven to be a great asset to the committee. Unanimously, the ATAC recommended his appointment as an At Large member. Recruitment for this and other open positions is ongoing.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Staff recommends the TCAG Board approve Mark Wall, for the At Large #2 position for regular ATAC membership as set forth in the attached draft resolution.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

There is expected to be some ongoing additional staff time and materials costs for committee coordination. This should not substantially impact TCAG's existing budget for active transportation planning.

#### SUBJECT:

**Information:** Implementation Status of Federally Funded Projects

### **BACKGROUND:**

The Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBGP), formally known as STP, is a major source of funds that may be used by local agencies for projects to preserve and improve the transportation system consistent with regional priorities. The funds may be utilized on any Federal-aid highway, including the National Highway System (NHS), bridge projects on any public road, transit capital projects, and intracity and intercity bus terminals and facilities. In Tulare County, these funds have been primarily used for street and highway construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, resurfacing, and operational improvements. Local agencies navigate a sometimes complicated federal aid funding process to request and spend these funds in a timely manner. However, through our partnership with Caltrans, TCAG has helped local agencies with the timely and efficient delivery of their projects.

The Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) Program has been a longstanding source of funding for TCAG's member agencies. Tulare County agencies qualify for funding due to the region being in a non-attainment area for meeting federal air quality standards for Particulate Matter (PM) and Ozone. The program exists under federal law and is implemented via guidance issued by the Federal Highway Administration and carried out by Caltrans. TCAG received estimates for the receipt of approximately \$6.2 million per year for the next four-year cycle. Project examples include roundabouts, signal coordination, compressed natural gas and electric facilities and vehicles, transit bus purchases, etc.

**Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Funds** are another invaluable resource to agencies in Tulare County. There are several funding sources under FTA that provide both operating and capital funds for urban and rural transit providers. Some funding is also provided to non-profit human services agencies in Tulare County as well.

#### DISCUSSION:

#### STBGP

The cities of Exeter, Farmersville, Tulare, Visalia and the County of Tulare each receive federalized STBGP fund allocations. In Fiscal Year 2019, \$2.992 million in STBGP funds are programmed in the Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP). The primary use of the funding is for roadway reconstruction and rehabilitation. As the Metropolitan Planning Organization for the Tulare County region, TCAG is responsible

for programming these funds in the FTIP and ensuring that the funds are being utilized appropriately. The status of STBGP projects programmed in the current fiscal year (19/20) as well as information on projects programmed next fiscal year (20/21) is shown on the table below:

#### **SUBJECT:**

Information: Senate Bill 1 (SB1) Competitive Programs Update

#### **BACKGROUND:**

On April 28, 2017, Governor Brown signed Senate Bill 1 (SB1) (Beall, Chapter 5, Statutes of 2017), which is also known as the Road Repair and Accountability Act (RMRA) of 2017. This Act provides the first significant, stable, and ongoing increase in state transportation funding in more than two decades. In providing this funding, the Legislature has provided additional funding for transportation infrastructure, increased the role of the California Transportation Commission (CTC) in a number of existing programs, and created new transportation funding programs for the CTC to oversee.

The purpose and intention of the Act is to address basic road maintenance, rehabilitation, and critical safety needs on both the state highway and local streets and road systems as well as provide transit assistance. SB1 affected eight different transportation funding programs including the Local Partnership Program (LPP) and Trade Corridor Enhancement Program (TCEP).

#### **DISCUSSION:**

TCAG staff has been participating in the guidelines discussions for the 2020 Local Partnership Program and 2020 Trade Corridor Enhancement Program. Draft guidelines for both programs will be presented to the California Transportation Program (CTC) on January 29, 2020. Final guidelines adoption for both programs is scheduled for the March 2020 CTC meeting. Information regarding funding caps, programming cycles, grant submittal deadlines, and other pertinent issues are shown in the table below:

#### **SUBJECT:**

Information: 2019/2020 Unmet Transit Needs

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The Transportation Development Act (TDA) of 1971 is the primary state law governing public transportation in California. The TDA requires that the local Transportation Planning Agency (TPA) identify the unmet transit needs within its jurisdiction and determine which of those needs that are reasonable to meet. TCAG is the designated TPA for Tulare County.

The TPA must conduct at least one public hearing as part of this outreach process. The TPA is also required under the statute to adopt a resolution establishing one of the following findings for each request: 1) item is not an unmet transit need; 2) item is an unmet need that is not reasonable to meet; or 3) item is an unmet transit need that is reasonable to meet. The TCAG Board has adopted definitions of an unmet need that is reasonable to meet. This definition is considered by the Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC), which reviews each comment received and makes a recommendation of findings to the TCAG Board for adoption.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

TCAG has implemented extensive outreach for the 2019/20 Unmet Transit Needs process, building on and refining the efforts of recent years. Outreach methods include:

- 1. Designing and distributing comment cards, posters, and on-board bus advertisements in English and Spanish countywide. Information is also included in Tagalog.
- Direct mailings to an extensive list of agencies, including social service agencies, the Tule River Tribe, civic organizations, community centers, clinics, libraries, and even local supermarkets to provide comment cards that residents can easily fill out and send to TCAG postage-free.
- 3. Working with Tulare County Public Health to post information in high traffic public buildings, and to increase awareness at local social service offices.
- 4. Posting official notices in local newspapers, in English and Spanish. Public hearings are being held in two locations.
- 5. Advertising campaign on Facebook and Instagram.
- 6. Creating and advertising an online survey (https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/RXQ5THS).
- 7. Extending the offer to attend existing community events to solicit comments, and providing information and materials to various stakeholders and TCAG committee members.
- 8. Accepting comments via a dedicated email address: TransitNeeds@tularecog.org.

Two public hearings are being conducted for this process on March 16, 2020, the first being at 1:00 p.m. during the regularly scheduled TCAG Board meeting, and the latter at 5:30 p.m. at the Porterville Transit Administration Office. Spanish translation will be provided at both hearings.

The final day to submit comments for consideration this year is March 31, 2020. Once all comments have been received, TCAG staff will review comments and distribute them to the respective transit agencies for responses.

In May, staff will provide all comments, along with transit agency responses, to the Social Service Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) for their consideration. The SSTAC will make recommendations for each comment received. The SSTAC recommendations will be brought to the Board for action in June. The adopted findings must then be transmitted to Caltrans. Identified unmet transit needs that are found reasonable to meet are required to be implemented before any allocation is made for streets and roads using TDA funds in 2020/21.

#### **SUBJECT:**

**Action:** Adoption of Resolution: Appointment of Three (3) Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) Members and Discontinuation of One (1) Position, Reducing Membership to Ten (10) Members

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The Transportation Development Act (TDA) requires each local transportation planning agency (TPA) to provide for the establishment of a Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC). The SSTAC is responsible for advising the TPA on transit issues, particularly those related to specialized transportation services, and for making recommendations on which comments received as part of the annual 'Unmet Transit Needs' process constitute unmet transit needs that are reasonable to meet. These recommendations are used as the basis for the formal Unmet Transit Needs Finding adopted by the TCAG board for submittal to Caltrans.

Membership is comprised of 11 members representing local transit operators, social services providers and potential transit users from certain transit reliant populations. Terms are staggered, with four (4) members' terms due to expire on June 30, 2020.

### **DISCUSSION:**

Presently there are four (4) SSTAC members whose terms are expiring on June 30, 2020. An additional (1) seat is currently vacant due to a resignation. Two of the vacant seats are designated for a representative of local social service providers to seniors, one for a potential transit rider with a disability, one for a transit operator representative, and one for a representative of Resources for Independence Central Valley.

Two current members- Rebecca Donabed, Representative for Potential Transit Users who are Disabled and Teresa Ortega, Transit Operator Representative- have expressed interested in serving an additional term. An application for appointment to the SSTAC as a representative of a local social service provider to seniors has been received from John Mauro, Deputy Director of Adult Services at Tulare County Health and Human Services Agency.

Additionally, the ability of the SSTAC to meet a quorum would be strengthened by the elimination of the position specifically designated for Resources for Independence Central Valley. The current member was appointed to a term concluding on June 30, 2020 but this position has been inactive for more than a year and historically has very low attendance rates. A representative from this agency would remain eligible to apply for other positions.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Approve Rebecca Donabed and Teresa Ortega to serve on the SSTAC for a three (3) year term concluding on June 30, 2023. Approve John Mauro to serve the unexpired portion of a term concluding on June 30, 2022. Discontinue the Resources for

Independence Central Valley representative position, reducing membership to ten members.

# **FISCAL IMPACT:**

There is no fiscal impact to TCAG. The SSTAC is required under state law.

**Information:** Status of State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) Allocations and California Transportation Commission (CTC) Update

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The CTC is responsible for the programming and allocating of funds for the construction of highway, passenger rail and transit improvements throughout California. The CTC met in Sacramento on January 29-30, 2020. The next CTC meeting will be held March25-26, 2020 in Santa Barbara. The STIP is a biennial document which covers five years of programming for transportation projects in California. The STIP is comprised of Regional Transportation Improvement Programs (RTIPs) from each of the counties in California and the Interregional Transportation Improvement Program (ITIP) that is developed by Caltrans. The RTIPs account for 75% and the ITIP accounts for 25% of the total STIP funding.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

### March CTC Meeting

#### SUBJECT:

**Information:** Update on Timing and Funding Implications of the Federal SAFE Vehicles Regulation

#### **BACKGROUND:**

In August 2018, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) and Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) proposed the Safer Affordable Fuel Efficient (SAFE) Vehicles Rule. On September 27, 2019 NHTSA published a portion of the SAFE Vehicles Rule as "Part One" (Federal Register, Vol 84, No. 188, Page 51310 et seq.). Part One is highly significant in that it includes the withdrawal of California's preemption waiver. That is, California's ability to adopt vehicle emissions standards stricter than federal regulations applicable nationwide. Part Two, which addresses the Corporate Average Fuel Economy (CAFE) standards has not yet been finalized.

SAFE Vehicles Rule, Part One, became effective on November 26, 2019 with, at least, the following implications for transportation planning and programming:

- Valley Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) will not be able to update Transportation Improvement Program (TIPs)/Regional Transportation Plans (RTPs) nor process Type 4/Type 5 amendments that require a new conformity analysis.
- Projects requiring project-level conformity analyses as part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process would not be able to receive federal approval.
- State Implementation Plan (SIPs) that were developed using EMFAC 2014/2017 may be found unsatisfactory and disapproved by EPA.
- For the 2020 STIP, it may not be possible to make programming changes if they
  require a Type 4/5 amendment. For example, if the change advances open-totraffic date or recommends a new project.
- For the 2021 FTIP, which is due in October of 2020, only an "exempt projects only" FTIP can be adopted if a conformity determination cannot be made due to EMFAC being invalid.
- Valley MPOs are responsible for adopting a RTP/SCS update by December 2022. If a way to conformity is not found by then, essentially all federal transportation funding and approvals are affected.
- Waiver withdrawal makes achieving greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction goals more difficult. Increased vehicle emissions will make it more difficult to meet the

GHG reduction targets in TCAG's 2022 RTP/SCS. A potential result could be that the region would become ineligible to pursue competitive funding under SB-1 and ineligible to receive its formula share of Local Partnership Program funds under SB-1.

The consequences stated above were anticipated soon upon the initial proposal of the SAFE Vehicle Rule in 2018. The TCAG Board, on April 15, 2019 adopted a resolution taking a position in support of maintaining California's Clean Air Act Preemption Waiver and directing staff to communicate TCAG's support by appropriate means to NHTSA, EPA and other agencies involved.

Prior to Part One becoming effective, Valley MPOs coordinated to expedite any currently needed Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP) amendments so that they could be finalized before the regulation changes go into effect. Items in the August, 2019, agenda included an amendment to TCAG's RTP and FTIP and approved delegated approval authority to the Executive Director. Most Valley MPO's, including TCAG, were able to adopt FTIP amendments in time to forward them for state and federal action before any danger of delay due Part One of the SAFE Vehicles Rule becoming effective.

California, along with 23 other states, have filed a lawsuit in response. The lawsuit does not request temporary injunctive relief. This means the rule will be in effect during litigation. Part Two of the SAFE Vehicle Rule is expected to be finalized in 2020. It is likely to be subject to litigation like Part One.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

At the December 4, 2019 meeting of the California Transportation Commission (CTC), the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) provided an update stating that because California's current mobile source emissions model, EMFAC, does not account for the new standards applicable under the SAFE Vehicles Rule, no regional or project-level conformity determinations can be issued at this time. ARB has published off-model adjustment factors for EMFAC output intended to replicate the effects of the implementation of SAFE Vehicles Rule, Part One. This could provide a way to make conformity determinations for non-exempt plans and projects in the short term. However, this tool does not yet have concurrence from EPA. FHWA will not proceed with conformity determinations without EPA concurrence. FHWA and the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) are still approving TIP amendments that do not require a regional emissions analysis.

ARB is waiting for the publication of Part Two in order to incorporate further changes into the adjustment factors. As of the date of this agenda item, Part Two of the SAFE Vehicle Rule was under review by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) and could be published within 60 days.

With regard to the 2021 FSTIP update, a bill is expected to be introduced in the California Legislature that would defer the update for two more years. This could buy time to fund those projects that would not otherwise need a further conformity determination. A deferral of the FSTIP update to 2023 would still be consistent with federal law. Staff is moving ahead with conformity tests for the TCAG 2021 FTIP incorporating the adjustments developed by ARB for Part One of the SAFE Vehicles Rule.so that the region is prepared to adopt a "full" FTIP (including all projects not exempt from air quality conformity) this summer should that be possible.

Staff will continue to carefully monitor and report on developments that affect these timeframe estimates as well as on state-wide efforts to minimize potential funding impacts.

# IV. TRANSPORTATION CONSENT CALENDAR - ACTION AND INFORMATION ITEMS

Request Approval of the Transportation Consent Calendar Action Item IV-A

A. Action: Adoption of Resolution: Safety Performance Management Targets for 2020 Upon a Motion by Member Mendoza, and seconded by Member Stammer, the Transportation Policy Advisory Committee unanimously approved the Transportation Consent Calendar Action Item IV-A. Absent: Vander Poel, Reynosa, Sayre, and Holscher.

#### V. TRANSPORTATION ACTION/DISCUSSION ITEMS

- A. Presentation: Pavement Marking Requirements from David Preston, President; and James Malloy, General Operations Manager with Safety Striping Service, Inc.

Mr. Giuliani provided an overview of the pavement rehabilitation project for SR-99 from the Kern County line to just north of Court Avenue in Pixley that is being proposed by Caltrans to be added to the 2020 State Highway Operation and Protection Program (SHOPP); and stated that it would be a great opportunity.

Upon a Motion by Member Townsend, and seconded by Member Vander Poel, the Transportation Policy Advisory Committee unanimously approved Item V-C as presented. Absent: None

- D. Information: Status of State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) Allocations and California Transportation Commission (CTC) Update

Mr. Brady explained that he would continue to carefully monitor and report on the unfolding developments.

Mr. Gutierrez outlined the guidelines for the Local Partnership Program and 2020 Trade Corridor Enhancement Program (TCEP). Mr. Gutierrez reported that the final guidelines discussion workshop had been held in February 2020 and guidelines for the 2020 TCEP program would be presented to the CTC at their March meeting for adoption. Mr. Gutierrez stated that the commercial avenue interchange project and the Tulare city widening projects were both being considered for funding through one or both programs.

# **H. Information: Caltrans Monthly Report**

Ms. Gordon provided an overview of various Caltrans projects being conducted within Tulare County. Member Gurrola highlighted two proposed assembly bills that were of interest AB1350, which would require agencies to offer free transit passes to students under the age of 18; and AB2012, which would require free transit passes to senior citizens.

Chair Crocker wanted to express that our hearts are going out to the city of Porterville during the difficult time and loss after the library fire.

Member Flores thanked Chair Crocker and added that it had been a difficult time for the community and shared that at the recent remembrance for Firefighter Patrick Jones and Captain Raymond Figueroa there were several thousand that came together to honor our fallen heroes and support the city of Porterville. #### **SUMMARY MEETING MINUTES**

(Minutes reflect agenda items discussed only)

#### I. CALL TO ORDER & WELCOME:

The meeting was called to order by Mr. Kimball at 1:35 p.m.

All action and informational documents were distributed for review and discussion. All actionable items would be voted on at the next Tulare County Association of Governments (TCAG) Board meeting, scheduled for February 20, 2020.

#### IV. TRANSPORTATION CONSENT CALENDAR – ACTION AND INFORMATION ITEMS

A. Action: Adoption of Resolution: Safety Performance Management Targets for 2020

Mr. Gutierrez stated that this was the third year that TCAG had done the Safety Performance Management Targets and would be recommending to the Board to adopt the Caltrans Safety Performance Measure Targets for 2020.

#### V. TRANSPORTATION ACTION/DISCUSSION ITEMS:

- A. Presentation: Pavement Marking Requirements from David Preston, President; and James Malloy, General Operations Manager with Safety Striping Service, Inc.

  Mr. Kimball stated that the presentation on pavement marking requirements would take place at the Board meeting.
- B. Action: Adoption of Resolution: Adopt 2020-2023 TCAG Transit Asset Management Targets

Mr. Bruno stated that Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO) adopt their own set of Transit Asset Management Targets in coordination with their member agencies followed by adoption by other agencies. He discussed the county wide standard for programing to address any transit asset management targets whenever there are changes to the Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP).

# C. Action: Approval to Work with Caltrans in the Development of a Trade Corridor Enhancement Program (TCEP) Grant Application

Mr. Giuliani stated that this is a great opportunity to work with Caltrans on TCEP grant application for a big SHOPP project on South 99. He discussed the need for using temporary detour lanes for the permanent lanes, trade corridor funding and cost savings for the project.

# D. Information: Status of State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) Allocations and California Transportation Commission (CTC) Update

Mr. Giuliani reported that the CTC agenda had been released for the month of March and updates would be given at the Board meeting. Mr. Giuliani also mentioned that the STIP was under programmed over the course of the five years and 8 million above the target was requested. He further discussed nuances and possible outcomes.

# E. Information: Implementation Status of Federally Funded Projects

Mr. Gutierrez discussed recent obligations and the April 1<sup>st</sup> deadline. Mr. Gutierrez provided an update regarding obligations for County of Tulare and Farmersville and stated that updates would be provided at future meetings.

Ms. Forte mentioned that the money would be out fast so the agencies would need to get their projects in by April 1<sup>st</sup>. Additionally, she reviewed CMAQ projects, STA funds and projects awarded.

# F. Information: Update on Timing and Funding Implications of the Federal Safer Affordable Fuel-Efficient (SAFE) Vehicles Regulation

Mr. Brady discussed the overriding issue of SAFE vehicles rule and that the issue has turned into part one and part two. Mr. Brady further explained that it knocked forecasting emissions out of line and until then FHWA had indicated that conformity wouldn't be certified. This would set nationwide fleet standards. Additionally, he stated that the ARB adjustment factor had been used and it appeared to be able to still past.

Mr. Brady shared that part two may be issued soon and that there may be emergency legislation that would change current state law requirement from two years to four years. Mr. Brady stated that he would continue to monitor activity in that regard and that comments received could affect determination.

# G. Information: Senate Bill 1 (SB1) Competitive Programs Update

Mr. Gutierrez provided an update regarding SB1 Competitive Programs. He stated that guidelines were being monitored and both programs guidelines were due for adoption. Mr. Gutierrez discussed the Commercial Ave interchange and Tulare city widening project and the application for INFRA. Additionally, Mr. Gutierrez highlighted the fund estimates.

#### H. Information: Caltrans Monthly Report

Mr. Navarro provided an update regarding projects in progress around Tulare County, SHOPP projects and setting up an informational workshop in that regard in connection with the standing Technical Advisory Committee Meeting.

#### VII. ASSOCIATION CONSENT CALENAR- ACTION AND INFORMATION ITEMS

# C. Action: Adoption of Resolution: Approval of Amendment No. 6 to the 2019/2020 Overall Work Plan (OWP)

Ms. Davis shared that the item was for clarification of item number seven from amendment four, reclassifying some TDA funding and increasing work element 601.04 for an electric vehicle charging station. Ms. Davis discussed specifications for the charging stations.

D. Information: Conflict of Interest Code (Form 700) Due April 1, 2020
Ms. Moore indicated that the item was a reminder that Form 700's were due for Board members and designated staff by April 1st.

#### VIII. ASSOCIATION ACTION/DISCUSSION ITEMS

#### A. Information: Legislative Update

Mr. Kimball highlighted the recent DC trip to lay the technical ground work for the upcoming year, sharing technical information on the interchange project which house representatives were very interested in. He stated another trip would be planned in June and he reviewed the priority project list including Highway 99 temporary lane conversions.

- E. Action: Adoption of Resolution: Transit Performance Measures

  Ms. Forte provided a brief background regarding transit performance measures, discussed urban and rural consistency and stated that they were up for adoption by the Board.
- F. Action: Letter of Support: Support, in Concept, Senator Beall's Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP) Update Timing Bill

  Mr. Giuliani stated that the Bill would allow delay of FTIP to the four year standard the federal government uses to keep the projects moving. He stated that it would be an emergency bill and would rather not wait to next Board meeting to get it approved.
- G. Information: Update to State Route 65, 99, 190, 198 Sustainable Corridors Committees (SCCs) of the Tulare Council of Governments (TCAG)

  Ms. Poleszczuk provided a brief background of the SSCs, their recent activities, and the committee's desire to be action oriented. She shared that the group was composed of electeds, county and city staff and citizens as well as Caltrans. Additionally she reiterated that the group's role was to advise the TCAG Board regarding corridor beautification.
- H. Information: Regional Transit Coordination Update Ms. Forte stated that the item would be on the agenda every month for a while and discussed details regarding the draft governance document. She stated that the item was open to adjustment, questions and comments and was scheduled to go back to the Board in May.
- I. Information: Miocar Project Update

Ms. Forte shared that she had met with the project staff, however they hadn't had a lot of hard data to provide. Ms. Forte highlighted the cost and program sustainability. Additionally, she shared the possibility of Miocar becoming a nonprofit in the future and shared details regarding the vehicle fleet and the desire for growth and to possibly work with member agencies in the future.

- J. Information: Update on 2020 Census Complete Count Outreach
  Mr. Brady share that he would be updating the Board monthly regarding Census and that
  TCAG was taking the lead in Complete Count Outreach for County of Tulare. He stated
  that Census day would be April 1 and gave a summary of January and February Complete
  Count committee meeting where there was a focus on Questionnaire Assistance Centers
  (QACs), media funding and they went around the room to all the members and listened to
  what everyone was doing as far as Census activity. He stated the pace would continue

through April and would start to wind down around June with Non response follow up.

Ms. Davis stated that the audit was complete with no findings, Lindsay was complete with no findings and other cities were in progress and would likely be finished by mid to late March.

**Information:** Regional Transit Coordination Update

#### **BACKGROUND:**

TCAG operates as a number of agencies. Various levels of regional coordination and oversight are the responsibility of TCAG acting as the federal Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), state Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) and local Measure R Transportation Authority. TCAG works very closely with member agencies and transit providers. As the region has evolved and transit has been changing, TCAG hired a consulting team to evaluate and make recommendations for improved transit efficiency and regional coordination in our region.

At the August 19, 2019 Board meeting, TCAG staff was directed to assemble an ad hoc committee to discuss concerns regarding transit coordination and the potential for exploring a Joint Powers Authority (JPA) or other formal coordination of regional transit service. The ad hoc committee prepared and presented a number of recommendations to the TCAG Board on December 9, 2019. Staff was directed to prepare a governance document and submit it for legal review.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The proposed governance document for a potential new regional transit agency has been reviewed by TCAG counsel and sent to each of TCAG's member agencies for their review and comment. Comments are due March 27<sup>th</sup>. Once comments are received and addressed a final document will be brought back before TCAG for approval for final circulation to member agencies.

In addition, TCAG works with the California Councils of Government (CalCOG), the Self Help Counties Coalition (Self Help), the American Planning Association (APA) and the National Association of Regional Councils (NARC) to advance the regional agenda and get additional support from the federal and state government.

Assisting TCAG staff in these efforts is our federal lobbyist, Pace Government Solutions.

#### DISCUSSION:

TCAG participated in a Valley Voice trip to Sacramento on March 10-11, 2020. A report of the trip will be given by those who attended.

TCAG is also preparing a Once Voice Trip to be held June 22-25, 2020in Washington, D.C. to discuss a number of transportation related issues, foremost among them is grant funding for the Commercial Interchange Project in Tulare.

TCAG has begun will be working on federal and state grant applications for funding to construct the commercial interchange in Tulare.

#### BACKGROUND:

TCAG staff has completed the 20202021 Draft Overall Work Plan and Budget. The OWP contains work elements with detailed tasks as well as revenues and expenditures anticipated by task for the year. Enclosed (*under separate cover*) is a copy of the draft 2020/2021 OWP.

#### DISCUSSION:

The total estimated expenditures for FY 2020/2021 are \$4,243,692. Of those expenditures, \$628,979 is Measure R, or LAFCO related and \$59,000 is the 2020 Census which is a one-time grant funded project. The following is a summary of major work products and highlights for FY 2020/2021:

- 7. Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) preparation for the 2020 RTP
- 8. Comprehensive Master Plan for Tulare River Native Community
- 9. Process and Manage the Local Transportation Fund (LTF) and the State Transit Assistance Fund (STA) for 2020/2021
- 10. Completion of the Urban Area Intelligent Transportation System Strategic Deployment Plan
- 11. Socioeconomic Data Updates for Travel Demand Modeling
- 12. Process amendments for the 2020/2021 Federal Transportation Improvement Program (FTIP)
- 13. Continued Measure R Implementation
- 14. Implementation, programming and tracking of the Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) projects

**Information:** Update on 2020 Census Complete Count Outreach

#### **BACKGROUND:**

# The U.S. Census Bureau

The U.S. Census Bureau counts each resident of the country, where they live on April 1, every decade. The Constitution mandates the enumeration to determine how to apportion the House of Representatives among the states and to distribute billions of dollars in federal funds to local communities. More than 70 federal programs that benefit California, including education, health, and transportation, use Census numbers as part of their funding formulas.

#### **California Complete Count**

California Complete Count – Census 2020 is a statewide outreach and awareness campaign designed to ensure the federal government collects an accurate and complete count of all California residents in the upcoming U.S. Census 2020. California's Census efforts are designed to supplement the U.S. Census Bureau's outreach campaign and through collaboration, avoid duplication of work.

#### **California Census Funding**

State leaders have made a significant commitment to California's outreach and communication efforts in support of the U.S. Census 2020 by investing in strategies and activities that will help ensure an accurate and successful count of all Californians, including approximately \$27 million in funding for local governments. The County of Tulare has chosen to participate in this funding program and executed an Agreement with the State of California, California Complete Count – Census 2020 in the amount of \$582,714 on March 26, 2019.

#### **TCAG Sub-contract for Census Outreach**

For both the 2000 and 2010 censuses, TCAG was the lead agency in Tulare County for formation of a Census Complete Count Committee and conducting outreach related to the California Complete Count. In terms of census outreach, California is considered to have one of the largest proportions of "hard to reach" populations in the nation. Tulare County is also considered to have one the highest proportions in the state. Tulare County has approached TCAG to again take the lead in these tasks for the 2020 Census. On January 28, 2019, the TCAG Board authorized the Executive Director to

negotiate an agreement with Tulare County to conduct outreach for the 2020 Census. The agreement between TCAG and the County was executed on April 15, 2019.

# **DISCUSSION:**

# **Tulare County Regional Complete Count Committee**

The Tulare County Regional Complete Count Committee (CCC) is comprised of representatives from a wide range of government, education, business, healthcare, media and community based organizations. At the most recent meeting held on February 11<sup>th</sup>, the committee reviewed the status of mini-grant agreements, and noted that mini-grant agreements have been sent to all the organizations recommended for approval.

The committee also discussed planned Questionnaire Assistance Center/Questionnaire Assistance Kiosk (QAC/QAK) locations and training materials. There are currently 43 QAC/QAK sites located throughout the county scheduled to open in mid-March following the mail-out of Census invitations. The Tulare Public Library and the Tulare County Office of Education conducted several training sessions in February to equip those who will be staffing the QACs.

In addition, committee participants shared information about their current Census outreach efforts and upcoming outreach opportunities. Many organizations continue to incorporate Census outreach in their ongoing events and as part of their regular interactions with clients. Fresh supplies of Census promotional items have been ordered to meet the needs of CCC participants for materials.

The Porterville CCC met on March 5<sup>th</sup> and discussed outreach being conducted and planned. TCAG staff is working in coordination with the Porterville CCC to support their outreach efforts and avoid duplication.

**Subject: Caltrans Implementation of SB 743** 

Ellen & Chris:

SHCC seeks implementation of SB 743 that minimizes or avoids increasing the cost and time of delivering vital transportation improvements for our member agencies, while also achieving the State's environmental goals.

The voters of California have entrusted Caltrans and SHCC member agencies with efficiently putting their tax dollars to projects they have voted to support. We believe that Caltrans is at risk of implementing new policy that does not appropriately consider its consequences on project delivery both for SHCC member projects and many Caltrans's projects.

Unfortunately, the Memorandum's public review and comment process is being shortchanged—the review and comment period for the drastic changes being proposed is a mere 8 days (including a holiday weekend). This hasty process is a sharp contrast from Caltrans's typical process for undertaking such sweeping changes.

It is unreasonable to give stakeholders a mere 8 days to review and comment on such a radical change to how transportation projects are analyzed. There are very good reasons why the new State CEQA Guidelines treat land use projects and transportation projects differently—requiring land use projects to use VMT, but *not* transportation projects. (See 14 Cal. Code Regs., § 15064.3(b).) The Memorandum's failure to reflect this critical distinction will have serious consequences for transportation projects, such as steep cost increases and delays, double counting of VMT impacts, exacerbation of the state's housing shortage, and unintended consequences such as *increases* in greenhouse gas emissions.

Thus, as is allowed under the State CEQA Guidelines, Caltrans and CEQA lead agencies on state highway projects should continue to have the discretion afforded to them to use level of service to analyze CEQA impacts—and let local land authorities use VMT for local land use projects, the true source of VMT.
