### **Regional Transportation Plan Scenarios**

TCAG reviewed the three scenarios from the 2018 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) and Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) to determine if the assumptions in the scenarios would be adequate starting points for the 2022 RTP/SCS discussion. Each of the 2018 RTP/SCS scenarios exhibited a different model of regional growth and travel preferences, and its effects on specific environmental topics. TCAG reasoned that beginning the 2022 RTP/SCS update with the same or similar scenarios as the 2018 RTP/SCS would highlight changes to the region's transportation and land use priorities over time. The three scenarios that were eventually presented to the public to select a preferred scenario for the SCS and to be included in and inform the 2022 RTP/SCS were: Trend, Blueprint, and Cross Valley Corridor Blueprint. All three scenarios were displayed and discussed at outreach events as well as online via social media and the TCAG website via Public Input.

### **Outreach Strategies and Covid-19**

During in-person outreach events such as the Tulare County Fair, it was ideal for community members to be presented with the scenarios on oversized display boards, demonstrating how TCAG's modeling programs had forecasted certain metrics to change based upon the specific regional growth and travel assumptions contained in that scenario. The display boards included maps demonstrating potential land use and development patterns, as well as the forecasted data regarding metrics focused on estimated Greenhouse Gas reductions per capita, urban residential density, acres of land consumed in new development, prime agriculture land consumed, critical habitat land consumed, vehicle miles traveled per household, emissions, water consumption, energy use, and transit ridership. Through the display boards, participants were informed of the forecasted impacts of each scenario before being asked to complete the survey and select a preferred scenario.

In many outreach instances, however, there was also an accompanying formal public presentation, highlighting the differences between the scenarios. In such instances, distribution of surveys via weblink and QR code followed the presentation, and community members had the opportunity to ask questions (in both English and Spanish) about the scenarios before completing the survey. Examples include attendance at city council meetings following ample public notice to encourage public participation and public community events such as harvest festivals. Additionally, Leadership Council for Justice and Accountability requested paper surveys to distribute to the communities they serve. A large portion of surveys were collected via Public Input through social media, county-wide publications, email blast advertisements, and the TCAG website.

Due to Covid 19, increased safety protocols, mandates, and higher-than-average Covid-19 cases in Tulare County, in person meetings and events dwindled to nearly zero. This put a tremendous strain on the momentum of RTP outreach efforts, but TCAG communicated with local organizations to engage the public with in-person presentations when safe and feasible. In view of these public safety consideration, and in recognizing that not all members of the public could attend in-person public events for various reasons, TCAG partnered with Food Link to extend outreach efforts to local food distribution sites in rural communities with minimal contact.



### **Survey Results**

Due to Covid 19, The RTP/SCS survey was available in a hard copy form on a limited basis due to requirements to reduce frequently touched surfaces to combat community spread and minimize having people congregate in enclosed spaces from different households to fill out surveys. A digital survey was made available with language translation options via Public Input. Social media ads were boosted for 10-20 days in a combination of English and Spanish verbiage. The first ad (see images in below in section 1A- Social Media Survey Analytics) received a total of 1,190 post engagements and reached 7,464 users. The Second ad (See image below in section 2A- Social media Survey Analytics) received a total of 825 post engagements and reached 8,626 users, totaling 16,090 residents reached via social media.



### **Resources and Other Public Agencies**

The development of the RTP/SCS, FTIP and Air Quality Conformity has been done in coordination with the San Joaquin Valley Policy Council (SJVPC). The SJVPC is comprised of the eight San Joaquin Valley Councils of Governments, Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Federal Transit Administration (FTA), U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), California Air Resources Board (ARB), San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District (SJVAPCD), and California Department of Transportation (Caltrans).

The TCAG RTP/SCS Roundtable provided a formal mechanism for obtaining input on the RTP/SCS development from various stakeholders in the community. The 2022 RTP/SCS Roundtable provided input at various critical stages during the RTP/SCS development process. The 2022 RTP/SCS Roundtable included representatives from the eight incorporated cities in Tulare County; The County of Tulare, through its Resource Management Agency; Tulare County Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCo); and Caltrans. It also included stakeholder representatives for the following community and interest groups: Public Transportation, Agriculture, Environmental Justice Community, Bicyclist/Pedestrian Advocate, Environmental Advocate, Health Advocate, Affordable Housing advocate, Building and Development, Tule River Tribe and two at large members. Representatives for additional stakeholder interest groups were invited to participate but decline to attend.

The Notice of Preparation (NOP) and Notice of Availability (NOA) for the 2022 RTP's Environmental Impact Report (EIR) were distributed to numerous resource agencies, other public agencies, and private companies and groups. Copies of the draft RTP (and the website location where such documents can be downloaded) were also widely distributed.
